# CITY OF CHARLEVOIX REGULAR CITY COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES Monday, November 19, 2012 – 7:00 p.m.

#### VII. Requests, Petitions and Communications and Actions Thereon

#### A. <u>Discussion Regarding Community Fireplace</u>

Councilmember Shane Cole stepped down from the dais.

The Mayor stated that architect Mark Buday had notified the City that he was ready to meet with Council. Mr. Buday was scheduled to appear on this meeting's agenda in order to work with the Council that was in place after the election. Mr. Buday does not have any suggestions at this point and no final decision will be made at this time. Mr. Buday has a proposal on how he would like to structure this process, which is what will be discussed this evening.

The Mayor reviewed the history of the fireplace and the Council's options. Council had approved the fireplace and has now halted construction on it to look at various options and modifications that may or may not happen. Council's options are: (1) to continue construction on the fireplace with any Council-approved changes or modifications; (2) to follow Mr. Buday's recommendations, whether it be regarding size, location, or whether the fireplace fits in the park.

Any recommendations brought to Council by Mr. Buday will be presented at a joint meeting with City Council, the DDA, and the Planning Commission. Council will act on any recommendations. Mr. Buday would like to follow a similar procedure as some other City projects by forming a steering committee made up of a diverse group of community members. The steering committee would provide guidance to Mr. Buday, who would bring a recommendation to Council.

The Mayor reviewed the parameters on the current fireplace. Different suggestions have been made for use of the money. The donor did not donate money to the City for use at its discretion. The money has been donated for a fireplace. Currently \$13,900 has been invested in the project. If the fireplace is to be moved to another location, that amount of money would be needed to duplicate the stage the project is at. Council would need to have an idea where those funds would come from and how they would proceed. Council's intention was to listen to all options. If the final decision is not to have a fireplace, there would be an additional cost of \$1,500, making the total \$15,400, because the log set would need to be returned and restocked.

The Mayor said the purpose of tonight's meeting is not to listen to people's likes or dislikes, and that there a several groups that appear to be set on what they want. He will form a Mayoral Steering Committee, which anyone may apply to be on. It will not be made up of people who are only for or against the fireplace. Mr. Buday wants a cross-section of all the different factions. The Mayor said that a significant time commitment would be necessary for this committee over the next couple of months, as the tentative plan would be for the committee to meet every two weeks. People interested in serving on the committee could either contact him directly or contact City Hall. The Mayor thinks the Steering Committee will be the most effective use of Mr. Buday's volunteered time. The Mayor assured the audience that, at the final item presentation, people will be able to comment on the recommendation.

Ken Polakowski read a summary from the Landscape Architecture Forum meetings. A copy of the summary will be filed with the agenda packet. The general consensus of those attending the forum was that there should be no fireplace in East Park and possibly none at all in the City of Charlevoix. The summary indicates that pledges have been made to cover the costs of removing the fireplace and proposed alternative uses to complete removal.

The Mayor stated that he had also been approached about taking the item to a vote of the people. The City Attorney has advised us that it is not possible for Council to put an advisory vote on the ballot. Upon questioning from the audience disagreeing with this opinion, it was explained that the previous action regarding the park had involved an ordinance and was placed on the ballot; this item does not involve an ordinance.

The Mayor called for public comment at 7:20 p.m.

The Mayor answered various questions from speakers in the audience:

- The committee is not necessarily limited to five people, but he would like to stay around that number as that is a good size for this type of committee.
- Council is not bound by the decisions of the committee. It is a recommending committee, just as all the other committees and commissions. However, he stated that Council wouldn't have come this far if they hadn't planned on considering the recommendation; they would've just let the fireplace be built as is.
- The donor is willing to listen to other options for locations, size, and modifications. However, the gift is a fireplace and he would prefer it to be in East Park.
- Third ward Councilmember Shane Cole has abstained up to this point due to the fact his wife works for DTE and there had been remarks suggesting impropriety. The City Attorney will research this conflict and if Mr. Cole is able to participate in discussions and vote, he will do so.
- The Mayor is looking for people to serve on the Steering Committee who have been involved from the beginning, are familiar with the project, and open to working with a cross-section of the community.

The Mayor reviewed that the Council and City Attorney's opinion is that this item did not have to go in front of the Planning Commission. However, Council intends to put the final recommendation in front of the Planning Commission because that was a concern voiced by the people in one of the previous meetings.

The Mayor closed the item to public comment at 7:27 p.m.

The Mayor called a short recess so that people who wished to leave could do so.

Councilmember Cole returned to the dais.

Council reconvened at 7:30 p.m.

## B. <u>Consideration to Approve Alternate Alignment for Lake to Lake Trail</u>

City Manager Rob Straebel reviewed the project for Council. The City of Charlevoix has been awarded a \$288,000 grant for work on the trail. Originally, the trail was going to run through an easement on the St. Mary Cement Company's property under a 10 or 20 year lease agreement. However, now MDOT wants the easement to be dedicated "in perpetuity," which St. Mary's is uncomfortable with. The Manager presented an alternate route through public property in order to proceed with the project and not lose the grant money. There will be extra engineering costs of \$31,500, which the Manager hopes to split with Charlevoix Township. There is a possibility that a lease can be negotiated with St. Mary's and construction funded locally for the original route sometime in the future. The Manager answered various questions regarding use and construction of the trail. Councilmember Stevens stated that, in his experience with working at the State Park, they get a lot of queries about how to get into town on a bicycle and a lot of people want to get to the trail going north to Petoskey; this trail will be well used.

The Mayor called for public comment.

Art Nash asked if the St. Mary's easement trail was more desirable. The Manager agreed that it would be. Mr. Nash questioned the decision to spend money on our second choice. He also questioned, once this trail is in place, if the City would really want to spend additional money for the other trail in the future. The Manager said the trail itself will be well utilized.

Motion by Councilmember Greg Stevens, seconded by Councilmember Lyle Gennett, to approve paying 50% of extra engineering costs of \$15,750 [City share, total cost \$31,500] for the realignment of the Lake to Lake Trail contingent upon Charlevoix Township's approval of paying the same amount.

He also informed Council that he was considering the possible locations of either near the football field or Veterans' Park. Art Nash stated he thought it was a great idea, but queried if this was considered as Council approval tonight. It is not. Council has not objected to the idea of it, the Mayor was making sure Council was aware of it when they heard about the fundraising, and that the final location has not been determined. The location may not be on City property.
